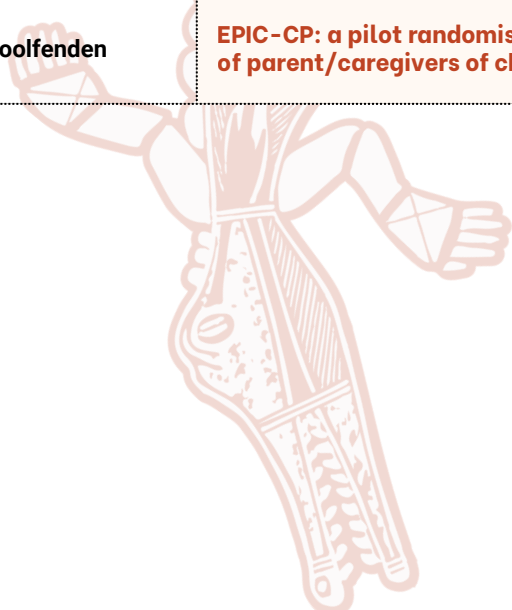

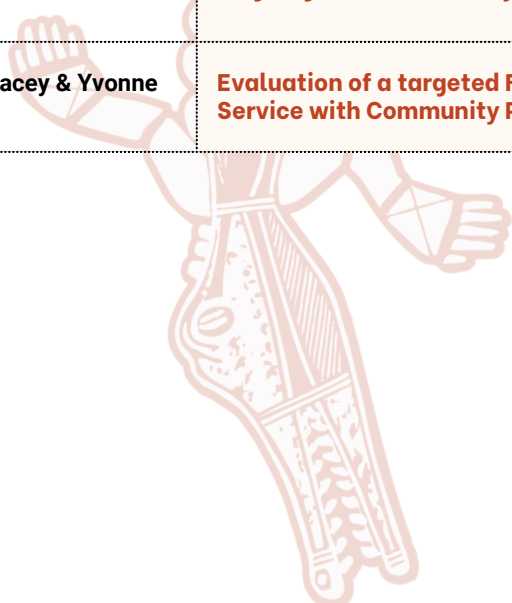

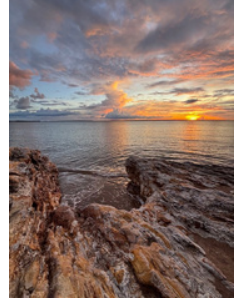
DARWIN, LARRAKIA COUNTRY

INTRODUCING OUR SPEAKERS



Dr Richard Fejo

Dr Richard Fejo is a Larrakia Man from Darwin from his father, his grandfather and his great grandfather in what culture calls "Grandfather lore".

Richard is also Warumungu from Tennant Creek on his mother's side and holds a great amount of cultural knowledge and experiences from both northern and Central Australia across the Northern Territory. Richard has worked for 30 years across 40 First Nations communities across the Northern Territory, training doctors in Aboriginal cultural practices in the last 15 years, earning his Honorary Doctorate from Flinders University in 2022. He is also a stand-up comedian and emerging singer and songwriter.



Prof Tom Snelling

Tom Snelling is a clinical scientist, Director of Health and Clinical Analytics in the School of Public Health at the University of Sydney, and an infectious diseases physician in the Sydney Children's Hospitals Network. He leads a team implementing learning health systems to improve healthcare and reduce the burden of infectious disease.

His collaborative projects across Australia cover a range of clinical domains, including improving treatment and prevention of severe gastroenteritis in remote Aboriginal children, primary prevention of food allergies, SMS-based interventions to improve immunisation timeliness, and improving management of cystic fibrosis.




Dr Jemima Beissbarth

Dr Jemima Beissbarth recently completed her PhD in otitis media (middle ear disease) microbiology. Her research focus is the bacteria involved in sustaining chronic disease, the associated antimicrobial resistance, and vaccine impact on these bacteria, including pneumococcal vaccines. Senior Research Fellow at the Charles Darwin University



Mililma May

Mililma May is a Danggalaba Kulumbiringin Tiwi writer and community organiser who has led and supported Northern Territory grassroots campaigns including Shut Down Don Dale, Save Lee Point, and Stop Middle Arm. A former CEO and co-founder of Uprising of the People Ltd, she carries forward her Old People's legacy, grounded in lived knowledge across Colonial and Traditional systems. She is currently Campaigns and Advocacy Manager at Change the Record, working for Indigenous self-determination and an inevitable future where every single Indigenous child can thrive.

Dr Louise Woodward

Dr Louise Woodward is a Northern Territory paediatrician and environmental advocate who has been adding a health voice to campaigns with environmental groups, Indigenous leaders, and public health organisations by highlighting the health impacts of fossil fuel projects on local communities in fossil fuel sacrifice zones, like her own home of Darwin. She has used her privileged role as a paediatrician to speak out publicly on the obligation of governments to prioritise human health by protecting air and water quality and over corporate interests.



Deshina Naidoo

Deshina is a Project Pharmacist for the Sydney Children's Hospitals Network working within the Clinical Governance Unit (CGU) and Children's Hospital Westmead (CHW) Pharmacy Department. She is the Executive Officer of the National Paediatric Medicines Forum under CGU and supports the pharmaceutical management of Advanced Therapeutics at CHW. Deshina has an interest in novel therapies in paediatrics and looks forward to developing resources, improving awareness and advocacy in the evolving paediatric therapeutics space.




Professor Shanti Raman

Prof Shanti Raman is a Consultant Paediatrician and Director of Community Paediatrics in South Western Sydney, leading clinical services in child development and child protection. She is Senior Clinical Advisor for Child and Family Health at the NSW Ministry of Health and Editor-in-Chief of BMJ Paediatrics Open. Her research spans migrant and refugee health, Indigenous child health, child rights, and global maternal and child health, and she is actively involved in policy development at state, national, and international levels promoting a rights-based approach to child health.



Dr Kiarna Brown

Dr Kiarna Brown is an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander descended from the Wuthathi people of Cape York Peninsula. She has traditional family ties with the Gurindji People of the Northern Territory, and the people of the Torres Straits. She was born and raised in Garamilla (Darwin) on the beautiful lands of the Larrakia Nation and is a Specialist Obstetrician Gynaecologist dedicated to strengthening health outcomes for Top End women. She is a Senior Research Fellow and Co-Lead of the Maternal Health Program at Menzies School of Health Research and clinical lead of the Australian Preterm Birth Prevention Alliance in the Top End.

Professor Amanda Leach

Prof Amanda Leach is a NHMRC Senior Principal Research Fellow and Leader of the Ear Health Research Program at Menzies School of Health Research, Darwin. Her work has had national and global influence through WHO recommendations for pneumococcal vaccine research, innovative multi-pathogen vaccine trials, and accredited national clinical guidelines for otitis media. A Member of the Order of Australia for her contributions to ear disease and Indigenous child health research, Professor Leach was also the 2019 NT Telstra Business Woman of the Year.



Dr Bianca Middleton

Dr Bianca Middleton is a general paediatrician with a strong interest in public health. She co-leads a program of immunisation research at the Menzies School of Health Research which seeks to optimise immunisation schedules and uptake for children living in rural and remote northern Australia.




Dr Felicity Wright

Dr Felicity Wright is the Director of Pharmacy at Sydney Children's Hospital. She trained as a paediatric cellular therapy and oncology pharmacist, is a Board Certified Oncology Pharmacist (USA), has a Master of Public Health Policy and a PhD in pharmacogenetics. Felicity leads a team of pharmacists, technicians and support staff practising at top of scope across clinical, production, and leadership domains. She has driven innovation in pharmacy-led models of care, integrating decentralised clinical pharmacy services, specialised pharmacy production, and the adoption of automation and robotics within pharmacy services to improve efficiency, quality, and workforce sustainability. Felicity also plays the Trombone in the Sydney Children's Hospital band, The Night Shift.



Professor Amy Gray

Prof Amy Gray is the Stevenson Chair and Head of Department of Paediatrics at The University of Melbourne, Consultant Paediatrician at The Royal Children's Hospital Melbourne, Australia and the Co-Chair of Melbourne Children's Global Health. She is a clinician, educator and researcher who has worked in the Asia Pacific for 20 years supporting paediatricians and other health workers improve care and outcomes for children.

A/Prof Jennifer Yan

A/Prof Jennifer Yan is a paediatrician and paediatric infectious diseases physician at the Royal Darwin Hospital and principal research fellow at the Menzies School of Health Research. She has been living and working in Darwin on Larrakia country for the past eight years, and co-leads a program of research and health system strengthening activities in Northern Australia and Timor-Leste, across areas including rheumatic heart disease, antimicrobial resistance, infectious diseases and OneHealth.



John Lawrence

John Lawrence has practised law in the Northern Territory since 1987, beginning as a Crown Prosecutor before leading NAALAS (now NAAJA) and joining the Independent Bar, where he has spent 28 years. Appointed Senior Counsel in 2010, he has appeared in many high-profile cases including several Royal Commissions. He has served as President of the NT Bar Association and CLANT, and as a Director of the Law Council of Australia. A passionate advocate for human rights and the rule of law, John has spent much of his career representing Indigenous people and organisations in their struggle against disadvantage and injustice.




Madison Groves

Madison Groves is a Paediatric Oncology Pharmacist at Sydney Children's Hospital Randwick. She has a strong interest in medication safety, education, and optimising therapy for children and adolescents with cancer through collaborative and evidence-based practice.



Professor Nelson Martins

Prof Nelson Martins is a Timorese medical doctor and public health leader who served as a frontline medic for FALINTIL during the independence struggle before becoming Timor-Leste's Minister for Health (2007–2012), where he led major health system reforms. He has authored 127 academic works, led 26 research projects — including Timor-Leste's first randomised controlled trial published in the BMJ — and presented at over 90 international conferences. Currently a Professor at the Menzies School of Health Research in Australia, he leads CAMO NET Timor-Leste, a collaborative network across 11 countries advancing public health systems worldwide.

A/Prof Sarah Cherian

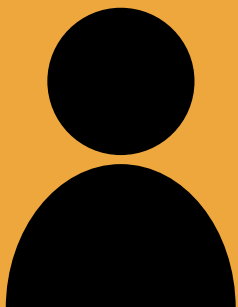

She has a strong background in clinical research, focusing on improving health equity and removing barriers to care for under-served paediatric populations.



Peter Barclay


Peter Barclay is the Director of Pharmacy at the Sydney Children's Hospitals Network (SCHN) and has worked as a Hospital Pharmacist for over 40 years. Peter is deeply committed to enabling access to appropriate medications for children and families and actively works to remove health barriers that exist in the health system. He is currently engaged in the provision of precision medicines, including gene therapies, for children at SCHN.

With extensive experience, Peter utilises pharmacy technology to deliver both patient safety and business efficiency. He is a strong advocate for the role of Hospital Pharmacists as clinicians, patient safety advocates, efficient pharmaceutical procurers, and key stakeholders in medication-related clinical governance.



Libby Coombes

Libby was born and raised in Darwin and the Tiwi Islands. Her first job was with the Community Development Program (CDP) Office in Pirlangimpi. She then worked at the Pirlangimpi School as a tutor for children needing extra help. She was selected by the local Tiwi Council for Aboriginal Health Practitioner (AHP) training in 1993. For family reasons, she needed to move to Wurrumiyanga and was unable to transfer her training position. She returned to AHP training as a mother of 4 children in 2000. After finishing her training, she worked as a casual AHP and a pharmacy technician for all 3 communities until a full-time position became available. Since then she has worked as an AHP for the Tiwi Health Board, the NT Government, and the Danila Dilba Aboriginal Medical Service. This has included important roles in the Midwifery Group Practice and the Department of Paediatrics. Currently, she is the Aboriginal Health Practitioner Coordinator for Top End Central. She works closely with Raelene, Roy, Keleasha, and Linda and has worked with Colleen and Anthea in the past.

Prof Gurmeet Singh

Professor Gurmeet Singh is Director of the Life Course Program at Menzies School of Health Research and a Specialist Paediatrician at Royal Darwin Hospital. With over 25 years of experience in Indigenous child health and epidemiology, she leads the Aboriginal Birth Cohort – the longest running longitudinal study of Aboriginal people in Australasia – generating critical evidence linking early life exposures to chronic disease outcomes including kidney disease, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease.

Professor Singh also holds a Professor of Rural Medicine appointment with the Flinders Northern Territory Medical Program and is committed to mentoring the next generation of clinicians and researchers.



Dr Hilary Hardefeldt

Dr Hilary Hardefeldt is a Paediatric Cardiologist living and working in the Top End of the NT. She trained predominantly in the NT, Queensland and Aotearoa New Zealand. Her research focuses on acute rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease.




Dr Paul Bauert

Dr Paul Bauert OAM is a General Paediatrician and lifelong Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians, and currently serves as Vice-President of the Australian Paediatric Society. Based in the Northern Territory, his clinical and research focus spans the impact of environmental factors on childhood disease, including infectious disease burden and chronic inflammation in childhood lung conditions. A passionate advocate for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander health, he has received the RACP Medal for Clinical Services in Rural and Remote Areas and two AMA President's Awards recognising his decades of advocacy for children's health and Indigenous health equity.



Dr Angela Titmuss

Dr Angela Titmuss is a paediatric endocrinologist and paediatrician at Royal Darwin Hospital and Senior Research Fellow at Menzies School of Health Research, working within the youth type 2 diabetes team of the Diabetes across the Lifecourse: Northern Australian Partnership. She is an Investigator on several studies exploring prevention strategies for obesity and type 2 diabetes in childhood, as well as the development of new models of care for management of youth-onset type 2 diabetes, and youth engagement. Angela has been the only paediatric endocrinologist in the Northern Territory for many years and provides outreach and clinical support across the region. She sits on multiple regional and national representative bodies regarding youth-onset type 2 diabetes and has been heavily involved in clinical guideline development and workforce education.

Simon Davis

Simon is a Darwin local and Mental Health Nurse, who has worked in the NT hospital system and headspace for most of his career.

In his current role, he manages a small multidisciplinary team within headspace Darwin/Palmerston that provides intensive support for young people in the 'missing middle' in youth mental health, presenting with complex mental health and social challenges. A large proportion of the young people supported by the program are First Nations young people.



Dr Mat Wong

Mat is a Neonatologist working for Darwin Newborn Services and clinical lead for neonatal retrievals & NETS NT. He has moved to the Top End after completing neonatal training across Queensland. Angelena Harradine

Angelena Harradine is a Senior Kaurra Ngadjuri Ngarrindjeri Narrunga woman. Angelena is a tireless Mintirninthi (Traditional Healer) who through education teaches about the importance of Indigenous knowledge and practices. She facilitates workshops and healing circles, cultural awareness workshops and runs the Yaitya Mintirninthi cultural healing centre. Through her work as a community leader Angelena is helping to keep alive the traditions and wisdom of her people, while also bridging the gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities and promoting greater understanding and respect between all people. She continues to pass on her knowledge to the next generation, ensuring that her traditions and practices will continue to be passed down for generations to come. Angelena has worked in Aboriginal health and worked closely with women and families experiencing domestic violence.



Natalie Hunter

Natalie Hunter is a Nykina/Jabba Jabba woman, born in Derby and raised in Darwin, Northern Territory. Natalie is passionate about advocating for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children in the child protection and justice systems. She has worked tirelessly to address the inhumane treatment of children incarcerated and champion human rights. As a founding member of Close Don Dale Now, she campaigns against the incarceration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and seeks to ensure that children belong on Country, not in prisons. Currently, Natalie is working with a group called Justice Not Jails, advocating against vigorous reforms to incarcerate children at 10 years, many of whom are Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children living with trauma and disability.

Admission requirements

Admission requires a medical degree. The advanced option is available to students who have completed the requirements for the master's degree with an average mark of at least 75% in 24 credit points of compulsory and/or stream specific units.

The degree structure allows students to **upgrade** to a higher award (eg MPhil and PhD) or **downgrade** and exit the program early provided course requirements are met. It is also possible to complete **a unit of study** without enrolling in a degree. The unit may be credited to a degree within two years of completion.

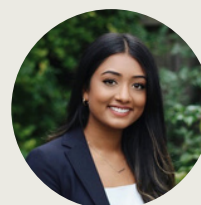
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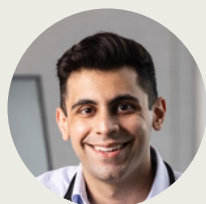
